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AMC SUCCESS STORIES: Don't Pay What You Don't Owe!

A new client came to our Medicaid Health Care Coordinator, Krys Arrick, claiming that Medicaid charges of over \$650 for an emergency room visit had been billed in error and were not owing. The client had kept good records of the event and her Medicaid coverage was in force. After problem discussing the and reviewing supporting documentation, Krys immediately went to work in support of the client's claims.

Krys called the Medicaid office involved, presenting facts and reasons why the billing was not valid. At the end of the conversation, it appeared that the matter had been successfully resolved. Turned out it wasn't quite that easy.

A few months later, the client notified Krys that she had received



a bill collector's letter demanding the entire original amount. Our Medicaid Health Care Coordinator quickly sent a letter to Medicaid, the emergency room health provider and the collection agency, documenting the client's eligibility for covered Medicaid services regarding the ER visit.

One month later, Krys received a letter from Medicaid saying the client was indeed covered, that Medicaid had instructed the health provider to correct all billing issues and had also contacted the

collection agency with instructions to make no further attempts at collection.

Our client was extremely happy with the results, and very pleased to know that AMC had a Medicaid help department and Coordinator ready and able to address problems and assist in clearing them up. Krys added, "I was really tickled that I could guide the process that fixed the problem. The client made it much easier because she paid attention to keeping complete records and documentation. But even when that isn't the case, we have methods and resources that can prove to be very helpful."

AMC's Medicaid Health Care Coordination Program deals with all things Medicaid from checking to determine eligibility to applying for coverage to any subsequent problems or issues that arise. Contact Krys Arrick at (719) 689-3584, ext. 111 for assistance.

SUPPORT FOR SENIORS: Now's the Time to Research Medicare Supplement Plans

for Better Coverage

Question: I know that I have Medicare A and B and D. I've been told I should also look into getting an advantage plan or supplemental plan. Can I do that at any time, or are there only certain times of the year I can make changes to Medicare?

Answer: What a great question and with perfect timing! The open enrollment period for Medicare begins Oct. 15 and lasts until Dec. 7. This is an opportunity to make changes that can benefit you for years to come. Don't wait and be surprised with original Medicare when they don't give you any out of pocket limits to cap your costs.

Medicare is not like employer health insurance. You will definitely want to check on the Medicare Supplement Plan or a Medicare Advantage Plan to guard against any surprises—and there are some great plans in Teller County. As a matter of fact, there is going to be a new one introduced this month for people who qualify for both Medicare and Medicaid and are thus considered "dual eligible". A dual eligible special needs plan may include dental, vision and hearing aid coverage as well as transportation vouchers for medical appointments.

We are partnering with Seniors Choice Benefits to hold community meetings during open enrollment: Oct. 24 from 10 a.m. to noon at the Bronco Billy's Casino Lounge, 243 E. Bennett Ave., Cripple Creek, Oct. 30 from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. At the Florissant Grange, #420, 2009

County Road 31, Florissant; and Nov. 20 from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. at the Woodland Park Library, 218 E. Midland Ave., Woodland Park.


